




Purpose of the Study

- To find out the average age of Canadian writers of prose at publication of their first book
- (novel, collection of short stories, creative non-fiction selfpublished and academic books excluded, poetry excluded)
- To find out the creative writing background of published writers.
- To see if any kind of trend of writing school influence can be determined from what we know so far.



How the Information Was Collected

- Using author web pages, email addresses in Writers' Union pages, leads through PWAC (Professional Writers' Association of Canada) and CANSCAIP (Canadian Society of Children's Authors, Illustrators and Performers) as well as Humber records, email addresses of prose writers were collected and they were written to and asked to respond anonymously to a 12-question survey on Survey Monkey.
- emails sent 1,547
- Responses 432



Question1:

This very short, 12-question survey is being to carried out by Antanas Sileika of the Humber School for Writers to study the ages and educational backgrounds of Canadian writers who have published non-academic books of fiction or non-fiction. Your answers are anonymous.

This questionnaire is designed to determine the age of first-time published prose authors in Canada, as well as their relationship (if any) to creative writing classes.







B) Self-published books are not covered in this survey. We are only asking about non-academic books of prose - fiction or creative non-fiction.


Have you published a book of fiction or non-fiction?



Question 3: Decade in Which First Book Published




Question 4: Age at Which First Book Published






Question 5: Years of Study in Creative Writing




Question 6: Gap between Completion of Studies and Publication




Gap in Years




Question 7: Disciplines of Study in Addition to Creative Writing




Question 8: Years between First and Second Book

Conclusions

- 1) Age of first time published authors continues to be relatively high at 42 in 2010. Even if writing schools are affecting publishing, those who enter the schools later publish sooner or those who graduate young are taking time to come out in book form. What is not true is that most authors of first books are "young" (as the popular press uses the term).
- 2) The number of authors who did <u>not</u> study creative writing at all before publication is still higher than the number of those who did. On the other hand, almost half of all published writers have indeed studied creative writing.
- 3) The "should" of "Should one study creative writing?" remains complicated. The majority of authors questioned chose to respond with commentary when asked to advise for or against the study of creative writing.
